MacDonald.

Q: What is the most common mistake parents make with their sons?

A: "Sometimes (parents and teachers) don't appreciate the needs of some boys to be so physically ac-

tive and kinesthetic. The parent may be disciplining their boy and they may expect him to sit still, thinking that as he's sitting still he's really listening, but in actual fact his ability to process is (diminished)."

Q: With those boys, is it better to take them for a walk to have a serious talk instead of telling them to sit still?

A: "You betcha. The walk is a good strategy; it's actually one I provide. In addition, just watch what their son wants to do in those moments of high stress. Don't interpret fidgeting or looking away as a lack of respect or a lack

of attending."

Q: What have you learned about parenting boys throughout your career?

A: "I've learned that parents can struggle with both girls and boys, but they especially struggle with the overtaggression, the pushing back, that can happen verbally or physically with boys."

Q: What are some guidelines parents can keep in mind when parenting boys?

A: "It's important to think about how they're going to share power with their boy. Whether it's an overly structured environment or a really loose environment, meaning the parent decides everything or the boy decides everything. Really, the answer is somewhere in between."

Q: Could you tell us more about that?

A: "If we want our boys to grow up to make healthy choices, choices that contribute to the community, we need to give them practice ... but the choices need to be age-appropriate."
